

## **MANDATE**

Resolution 07/2023 mandates BCAFN to work with First Nations in BC to develop the *First Nations* Climate Leadership Agenda in British Columbia (the BC FNLC Agenda) and ensure their recommendations and policy directions are fully considered in the Canada-wide First Nations Climate Leadership Agenda.

## **BACKGROUND**

BC FIRST NATIONS CLIMATE LEADERSHIP AGENDA Canada has committed to co-developing a distinction-based <u>Indigenous Climate Leadership Agenda</u> (ICLA) (*Art. 46 UN Declaration Act* Action Plan) that would build regional and national capacity and progressively place authority and resources for climate action in the hands of First Nations, Inuit, and Métis peoples and representative organizations.

The <u>Joint Committee on Climate Action</u> (AFN-Canada technical table) laid the foundation for the Climate Leadership Agenda specific for First Nations (FNCL Agenda).

INDIGENOUS CLIMATE LEADERSHIP AGENDA BCAFN and <u>Nagsmist</u> have joined forces to collaborate with First Nations Rights and Title holders in developing the FNCL Agenda in BC. The BC FNCL Agenda will complement the work undertaken by the First Nations Leadership Council (FNLC) to implement the <u>BC First Nations Climate Strategy and Action Plan.</u>

The BC FNCL Agenda will inform the Canada-wide FNCL Agenda, ultimately shaping the ICLA. The ICLA will be presented to Cabinet and Treasury Board for implementation.

The FNCL Agenda will provide a roadmap to ensure federal climate policy and legislation:
